June Top Tips

This month our streets are blooming, our skies are filled with bird life (and if you are lucky our urban swifts) and our insects are buzzing. It's a great time to get up close to nature.

On your street here is what you can do to help care for nature this month

1.

Identify the plants on your street (those outside on pavements) and complete our online form. You can use our new wildlife ID guide to help you. Recording species is super important for our project and it's also a fantastic way to connect with wildlife and discover more about pavement botany. We have so many species in our area. Here is a link to the form (you can also find this link on your website page). You can also upload images of plants you can't identify.

2.

Using our ID guide, which has a key to advise you, decide if you need to remove or cut back plants. Follow guidance in our Frequently Asked Questions on your website page. If you have a problem plant which needs more effort to remove please email Tony at NCC - details are on your website page and NCC will come and remove it (poison free of course) Please keep safe and always wear protective gloves.

Photograph your street wildflowers and share on social media or upload them on the recording form. We want to celebrate our urban nature as much as possible. Here is our <u>FB</u> page, our <u>INSTAGRAM</u> and our <u>TWITTER</u>

Keep an eye out for spraying!! We have had news that one of our streets in the pilot has been sprayed with pesticide: (We accept mistakes happen, but we do need to report them and help prevent this happening again

We will be keeping everything crossed. We will find out if we are successful at the end of June...

In other news

This just goes to show that in our urban areas we can make a huge difference for nature. We are also creating a new Swift Street on Central Avenue this year, which we are super excited about!
